Course Description

This course aims to introduce students to two things: a) mathematical reasoning, and b) writing proofs. We will first discuss logical language, operations, and methods of proofs in general. We will then study set theory and functions. After this, we will move on to the topic of cardinality. The remainder of the course will deal with selected topics in elementary number theory. Classes will meet online (on Zoom) twice a week at the times specified above. At the end of this course, students should have a better foundation to proceed to upper division courses.
