Oral Exams. There will be no written midterms or final exam in this course. Instead, students will take two 5-minute oral exams, once with the instructor and once with the TA. The first oral exam will be scheduled during the week of October 19th, and the second during the week of December 14th. You will be given the exam questions beforehand to prepare (although they will

be slightly modified during the actual interview). The oral exams will take place over Zoom. You will have the option of communicating mainly by writing if English is not your first language. The two oral exams together are worth 50 % of your final grade—the one with the higher score being worth 30 %, and the one with the lower score being worth 20 %.

Weekly Homeworks. Homeworks will be assigned on Blackboard (almost) every week. They will be due a week later on **Tuesday** at **11:00 PM**. The solutions must be submitted online through Gradescope. Late submissions will NOT be accepted. Further details about Gradescope is posted on Blackboard under “Documents.” The homeworks will be worth 50 % of your final grade. The lowest two homework grades will be dropped.
